FROM YOUR INTERIM MINISTER

This past month I have been talking with numerous ministerial colleagues interested in the ministry of the Unitarian Fellowship of West Chester. Never before in my career as an interim minister have I seen a church generate as much interest as West Chester has. My telephone has not stopped ringing, and I have had some difficulty keeping up with all the requests for information.

As Martha Stewart might say, "It's a good thing." The display of interest among my ministerial colleagues means that the Unitarian Fellowship of West Chester is communicating well its future ministry to those who are interested. It also means that the work that the Fellowship undertook last year to understand growth issues and to make real changes that will help in the future have been noticed by many clergy. And they are enthusiastic about this congregation's willingness to examine itself and to learn new ways of being a church.

During the next month you will probably not see much of the Ministerial Search Committee members. They will be talking to ministers and meeting even more intensely than they have been. All of my ministerial colleagues with whom I have spoken have mentioned the Ministerial Search Committee. Colleagues have voiced their positive impressions of the Ministerial Search Committee and the Fellowship. Sometimes I have heard them say things like, "I was surprised that a small congregation could undertake such a professional-looking packet" or "The West Chester Fellowship has done and is doing the kinds of things that most congregations its size are unwilling or unable to do." These kinds of comments reflect

well on you as a congregation. They reflect well on the Ministerial Search Committee too.

Though you will not see the members of the Ministerial Search Committee often in February, I hope that when you do that you will give them your thanks for their hard work. They are **Jim MacFadyen (chair), Cyndy Bullaughey, Ed Cohle, Curt Hoganson, Eileen Kelly, Sandy Schaal, and Mark Steel**. They have been working long hours at the Fellowship. Their partners hardly recognize them due to their Ministerial Search Committee schedules. Due to the private nature of their work, they cannot tell Fellowship members where they have been or with whom they have been speaking. When you see them, thank them for their hard work. They need to be recognized!

You have also made this congregation appealing to my ministerial colleagues through your work and commitment. This is a congregation of dedicated people. Time and again ministers have expressed interest because this is a congregation that is willing to move, while retaining some of the elements that define its central identity.

As I have spent time with the Fellowship I have begun to recognize that its commitment to caring for each other, breaking bread, exploring new ideas and trying to reach out to its larger community are part of the identity that makes West Chester so appealing. This is a good church trying to grow in body and spirit. I guess that the thing that moves me the most is not some sort of quantitative, numerical success, though I would be pleased to see that, but the congregation's willingness to try. I hope that as you read this that you

will understand that ministers have heard the good things about this congregation and that they are interested. They are interested because you are a good, religious community with great possibilities. They are interested because your Ministerial Search Committee is devoted to this effort.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES JANUARY 10, 2006

Executive Treasurer Erach Patel presented the Treasurer's Report for December that included an outline of estimated expenses for several building improvements, plus the funds available to cover those expenses. The Board approved the allocation of funds as presented.

Chair Bruce Koepcke reported for the Bridging Team. The Team is working with UUA consultant Tom Chulak, and is moving ahead in its role as an advisory group to the Board as the UFWC transitions from a Pastoral to a Program-sized church.

The Board passed a motion to schedule a goal-setting retreat on February 25.

The Board voted to call a Congregational meeting on January 29. The meeting's purpose will be to obtain Congregational approval for a Chalice Lighters Innovative Growth application. A mailing will be made to notify the Congregation of the meeting.

FROM THE PRESIDENT

As I write this, I've just returned from our after-service January 15 work party, organized to empty out the sanctuary and upstairs office in preparation for a chemical cleaning of the floors. Under normal circumstances, I'd hardly call lifting chairs onto a stage and hauling furniture down the stairs a "spiritual experience." But I am energized and renewed in spirit from what I saw and felt in the Fellowship building as we worked.

The sense of community and the shared – I'd even say joyful - camaraderie made this much more than a work party. Older and newer members and friends (both in terms of age and association with the Fellowship) took over with little direction and did what needed to be done in little more than an hour. We were family, coming together for the common good. At the risk of sounding just a little bit sappy, I got downright emotional, thinking about what this seemingly mundane activity signified in terms of who we are as a religious community. It occurred to me that our ability to come together with enthusiasm and energy, no matter what the task, has been one of our greatest strengths and has sustained us through many difficult challenges over the years. I'll be relying on that strength as we work through the very ambitious agenda we have before us in the next few months. I encourage all of you to draw on that strength as well.

Addressing the floor project specifically, it should be just about completed by the time this Fellowtarian reaches your home. It's my hope that the chemical cleaning will greatly improve the appearance of the floor, but I do

not believe it will come close to giving us the appearance of a new or completely refinished surface. Please keep that in mind when you assess the results.

More pressing on my agenda as I write this is completion of an application for a Chalice Lighters' grant. These grants are awarded in various categories by the Growth and Extension Committee of the Joseph Priestley District of the UUA; we are applying in the "innovative growth" category. With a Feb. 1 application deadline looming, I am feeling somewhat pressured by all that needs to be accomplished. At the same time, I'm very pleased with just how the decision to apply came about. As I shared with you in an earlier e-mail, our commitment to growth and the work we are doing with our Bridging Team led our consultant, Tom Chulak, to encourage us to apply. We are apparently making a name for ourselves as a congregation that saw a challenge and is rising to meet it!

Vice President Bob Scott and Finance Chair Erach Patel are working hard with me on the grant application, and we expect to also draw upon the grant-writing experience of Pam Sapko. In addition, we will receive input from a member of the JPD's Growth and Extension Committee. We expect to have a finished document ready for your vote at a congregational meeting after the second service on January 29; please plan to attend if you possibly can. While we have no guarantee of receiving the grant money, we do know that a congregational vote strengthens our chances.

Your entire Board of Trustees is also looking at recommendations for changes in governance that were presented to us by the Bridging Team in January. These recommendations are intended to provide the structure for operating more efficiently as a larger, program-sized congregation. In accordance with the recommendations, the Board has scheduled

NOTES FROM UNDERGROUND – RELIGIOUS EDUCATION UPDATE

With both Christmas and New Year's Day falling on Sundays, it was a fairly quiet December in RE, but that just gave us more time to plan for January, including our first-ever Indoor Family Camping event on January 27.

It was wonderful to welcome everyone downstairs after services on January 8 for Coffee Hour refreshments. We wanted to spotlight the improvements that were made to the RE space over the past year thanks to the efforts of the Building Committee, the RE Committee and other volunteers. If you weren't there on the 8th and haven't seen the improvements yet, please stop down and take a look.

Looking back as we approach this year's halfway mark, I feel that we have made a remarkably smooth transition to double services. As expected, we have more children in attendance at the 9 a.m. service, but there is a strong core group attending at 11 a.m. The RE Committee's planning, and the follow-through and commitment from teachers and the other Sunday volunteers have been key in our success.

Social Action Sundays – We are continuing to develop ways we can fulfill our commitment to befriend the children at the Holland-Glen hospice. This month we'll be making Valentine's cards and cookies for the children.

Last month, with \$40 previously collected, the children voted to donate two flocks of chickens through the Heifer Project. The children would like to be able to donate a water buffalo (a goal of \$250) so we have started brainstorming ideas for fundraisers

Ninth Grade – January marked the halfway point for the Coming of Age class. They came

to the conclusion of Heresy Apparent, a curriculum that explores the lives of famous and not-so-famous Unitarians and Universalists, and have embarked on a program of self exploration. With the support of adult mentors from within the congregation, the students will wrestle with questions such as: Is there a God? If so, what do I believe about him/her/it? Do I consider myself a Unitarian Universalist? If so, why? In June, the members of the class will have an opportunity at a Sunday service to

share their journeys and discoveries with the congregation.

RE Committee – At the end of the month, the Religious Education Committee will conduct its Third Annual Retreat in Phoenixville. In the workshop portion of the Retreat we'll use the curriculum "Articulating Your UU Faith" to help develop our two-minute "elevator speeches," i.e., a brief response to the question, "What's Unitarian Universalism?"

a February 25 retreat to set three-year goals. Bruce Koepcke, Bridging Team chair, will facilitate that retreat with assistance from other members of his team.

Meanwhile, Cheryl Pittenger continues to work with her ad hoc committee to refurbish our office; we expect that work to be completed before candidating week for a new minister in April. The downstairs foyer area will be refurbished as well. Sheila Cain, whose artistic talents have been utilized in many past projects, will lead the effort in that area. And have you been wondering what happened to the project to enclose the porch? It was delayed because of other more pressing building issues, but we're ready to move on it now.

To a certain extent, all of this is dwarfed by the work of our exceptional Search Committee. I understand from Committee Chair Jim MacFadyen that our enthusiasm and commitment is coming through to potential candidates, who say they appreciate the work we have done to prepare for growth. I'd add this to Jim's report: It's the Search Committee who portrayed our Fellowship so beautifully through their creatively designed and very comprehensive packet for candidates. And that's been only a fraction of the work they've accomplished. If there were a Unitarian heaven, I'd nominate them for sainthood.

Finally, those who know me realize that I get frustrated by "hanging issues." I like to see the period at the end of the sentence, and I want problems resolved yesterday, so to speak. For that reason, I'm especially delighted to see progress on some of our long-standing issues. But I know many more challenges wait in the wings, especially with the probable call of a new minister. I have every confidence that we can meet these challenges, whatever they may be, by continuing to work together for the common good of our very unique and special religious community.

HELP PLEASE?

As Vice-President I'm also the chair of the Fellowship Council — which is currently a group of committee chairs that meet and focus on operations issues leaving the Board to focus on strategic issues. This is all still being defined, with the Bridging Committee working hard to get it all laid out, but we're having fun getting started.

As part of the operations side, I'm very aware of all the jobs that are being done by folks in this fellowship — and it's an incredible effort going on when you stop to think of all that's just getting done week in and week out. I'm also very aware of the things that are not getting done due to lack of folks available on various committees or in specific tasks. Even though there are several very busy short term committees (such as the Search Committee) that prevent those folks from helping in other areas right now, I have to believe that there are some folks who may have joined us recently or are just coming back from a long winter's nap who may be wondering how they could help and are not knowing where to turn.

So I'd like to use the *Fellowtarian* to communicate some of this, from the perspective of the Leadership Council and Board who are trying to get some things accomplished and are frustrated by not having people to hand things off to.

So here's a shot at what I know right now — and hopefully we'll use this space (and some bulletin board space) to keep the needs list active and available.

First things first — I'd like someone to volunteer to write this monthly column. And I'd like someone to volunteer to help me with the Fellowship bulletin boards.

Second, there are three com-

mittees that I think need additional members and/or leaders.

Social Justice — chair and more members. Tom Townsend chairs this committee and also is our UUSC Regional Representative. His heart and efforts are truly in the UUSC work, where he's been such a great asset to us and to the Regional effort. He has approached us about the need for a Social Justice Chair. The committee is well staffed by folks who are doing many good things in our community, but Tom feels (and I agree) that it needs someone who can coordinate those individual efforts better and connect the congregation better to the community action we are or could be doing. If anyone wants to make a big difference this is a chance — and you'll get lots of help.

Leadership Development — chair and more members. This is the former Nominating committee. As part of our changing governance model we've concluded that this committee should be standing year round. Not only should it recruit for Board positions and a few key committees, but it should expand into helping us put a leadership transition plan in place — including leadership training and succession planning. This corresponds with the new program size congregation we plan to become. We need a chair, and another member would be good as well. It's a very high impact position, and will take some start up effort, but the intention is to get this process organized so that it runs smoothly going forward.

Communications — chair and more members. John Orban, currently chair, feels it's in great need of some re-thinking and sorely needs members to help with tasks and someone to coordinate all of

this. We also need many specific tasks done to facilitate both our internal communications with each other and our external communications with the community at large. Here's a list:

- Marketing/Advertising coordinator to focus on best ways to get the word out about our wonderful Fellowship.
- Bulletin Board coordinator to make best use of our internal communications - work closely with council, board and committees.
- Web Page, internal and external — Someone could play coordinating role for external communications, and another for internal communications using the very capable web resources we already have in place with Steve and Devon.
- People with writing skills to help with articles.

If any of this tickles your fancy, contact me or Flo or any board member.

REGIONAL SOCIAL ACTION COMMITTEE FORMING

SOCIAL JUSTICE

Many of you heard the very fine sermon about Rev. King and Social Justice on January 15 by Susan Minasian, Director of Admissions at Lancaster Theological Seminary. In talking with her after the service, I asked what we should be doing. Her response surprised me. "Be more verbal," was her first advice. UUs should speak up more not only for human rights and social justice, but also for their religion. We're the best kept secret in town, she said. So we need to tell more people not only what we fight for but also what we believe in.

Social justice is a topic that you, the members and friends of UFWC, have repeatedly said you support and want to be an integral part of your congregation. You'd also like the Fellowship to embark on a congregation-wide project. The Social Justice Committee is working on a plan whereby we'd become affiliated with a local social justice agency. There would be plenty of work of many different kinds to go around. Would you be willing to participate? I hope that the answer will be a resounding "YES". Stay tuned.

Although we've been pretty good about distributing the Guest at Your Table boxes in the late fall, we're not so good about collecting them. But all is not lost; you can still turn in yours to Rob Sartain or Tom Townsend. If you don't have a box, then please consider a gift to OUR charity, the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee; just make out your check to UUSC.

At UUSC they put our UU values into action all across the U.S. and around the world every day. What does UUSC do? That's a fair question. A main area is that they assist the marginalized, who are not helped by the big charities or local governments. For example,

Along with reading and scrapbooking, she enjoys boating on the Chesapeake Bay with the family.

a recent report indicated that they are still helping the victims of the Tsunami, specifically women who are not eligible for assistance through their governments because they are women.

That's the kind of work that UUSC does. So please join or renew your membership. This year it costs \$40 per adult or \$75 per couple, with the first \$1000 matched within UFWC and all gifts of \$75 or more matched externally. You can have your gift quadrupled! UFWC stands currently at 76% membership, by far the highest within our district. But that's not good enough. Let's make 100%. We won't rest until we do.
